

Long section north-south showing the new massing on the east side of the stadium






4.3 Appearance and materials

Appearance

The south stand of Twickenham stadium is a combination of stone cladding and curtain wall glazing with some solid infill panels within the façade system. The new extension to the east stand is sympathetic to this context and has been designed to complement it's visual aspect in both materials and tone. A mix of light porcelain rainscreen panelling and grey framed glazing has been used to create the east stand façade whilst the composition and scale is in keeping with the stadium.

The following images highlight the appearance and scale of the proposed extension.

Materials

The extended slabs are clad in materials sympathetic to the south stand, utilising a combination of curtain wall glazing coloured as the south stand, porcelain rain screen cladding with a base of porcelain tiles and aluminium shingle rainscreen cladding.

Back painted spandrel panels form the glazed sections in front of floor slabs and services zones and continue the main glazed appearance down the façade.

Dark grey PPC louvres enclose roof plant either side of a glazed screen to the open roof terrace which is covered with a standing seam roof.

The lower perimeter fence which incorporates gates for post-match egress and the turnstiles between is galvanised and powder coated double mesh security fencing.


The central section of façade is a mix of double glazed curtain walling with tinted glass. Solar control is by means of pressed metal vertical fins. Within this build up are integrated louvres at mid and low level to allow for air intake and extract to service the accommodation within.

To the central zone above the fence and turnstiles is a glass canopy within a white painted steel frame.

The main lower level columns are white painted circular hollow section steel columns.



Typical glazing panel (no patternation)




Typical glazing panel (no patternation)





The western elevation of the proposed east stand extension is largely formed of louvres which form part of the ventilation strategy for the proposed extension. Through preapplication meetings with London Borough of Richmond planners, the question was posed on the ability for the proposed development to accommodate potential longer term expansion of stadium facilities around the existing bowl. Although similarly not part of the application, the proposals would not preclude future expansion, the extract from the kitchens at levels 4 and 4A and air extract from L3 space could be relatively simply routed to new roof plant on a future north stand extension, or alternatively incorporated into a louvre zone forming part of the architectural design of a new North Stand development, should one be brought forwards in the future.



4.4 Townscape and key views

The majority of people arriving at Twickenham Stadium arrive from Twickenham station to the south, along Whitton Road, across the A316 and arriving at the south east corner of the stadium site. Glimpses of the stadium start to appear mid-way through this journey and this is when small sections of the proposed extension will be visible. The other two routes of approach are from the west along Whitton Road and from the north along Rugby Road. There will be no visual impacts from the proposed east stand extension on any views when approaching from the west. The other two approaches will have variations in the streetscape from what exists today. These two key approaches have been modelled to compare the existing scenario with the proposed as seen below.

Because of the angle of Whitton Road the overall impact of the new extension is considered to be minimal. The new façade creates a continuation of the south stand wrap heading north and is kept within the existing heights and scale of the stadium; more in keeping with the south stand.


