To put a school on this site is very shortsighted. Has the council taken into consideration the catastrophic result of the bottlenecks of traffic on the narrow roads connecting this site to the whole of the area stretching beyond Lonsdale Road towards Hammersmith, clogging up same road when there are already two schools on this road, then going in the areas, Mortlake High Street and the Lower Richmond Road up to Chalkers Corner. At the present time it is difficult enough even with traffic lights to turn left from this road onto Richmond. Surely it beggars belief that this scheme will go ahead due to the almost unanimous and common sense opposition of us.

I trust it will be realised the terrible consequences of congestion (especially during school times, and clogging up of buses and cars to not only the environment but quality of going about this borough and further. We have not even begun to mention the chaos at the level crossing. Perhaps you have plans quietly for the future demolition of the areas around this scheme to make this unpopular and ill thought out scheme possible?

You may say a school is necessary - but there are other sites in the borough that can be put to use with determination and will.
