POLICY REQUIREMENTS

National Planning Policy Framework:

Paragraph 128: In determining applications, local planning authorities should require an applicant to describe the significance of any heritage assets affected, including any contribution made by their setting. The level of detail should be proportionate to the assets' importance and no more than is sufficient to understand the potential impact of the proposal on their significance. As a minimum the relevant historic environment record should have been consulted and the heritage assets assessed using appropriate expertise where necessary. Where a site on which development is proposed includes or has the potential to include heritage assets with archaeological interest local planning authorities should require developers to submit an appropriate desk-based assessment and, where necessary, a field evaluation.

Paragraph 133: Where a proposed development will lead to substantial harm to or total loss of significance of a designated heritage asset, local planning authorities should refuse consent, unless it can be demonstrated that the substantial harm or loss is necessary to achieve substantial public benefits that outweigh that harm or loss, or all of the following apply:

② the nature of the heritage asset prevents all reasonable uses of the site; and ② no viable use of the heritage asset itself can be found in the medium term through appropriate marketing that will enable its conservation; and ② conservation by grant-funding or some form of charitable or public ownership is demonstrably not possible; and ② the harm or loss is outweighed by the benefit of bringing the site back into use.

Conservation Area appraisal, or in relation to a Listed Building, Scheduled Ancient Monument or Historic Park or Garden.

- o Set out how particular attention has been paid to scale, proportions, height, massing, historic building lines, the pattern of historic development, use, design, detailing and materials.
- o Conserve and retain original or historic garden or landscape features as well as architectural features such as windows, doors, chimney stacks, walls and gates.
- o Describe how the proposal retains the integrity and significance of the building as a whole, the location and hierarchy of rooms, historic floor levels, the structure of the building including foundations, fabric as well as features such as original staircases, original roof structures and other features identified as being of significance.

Demonstrate that the proposal is of exceptional design that integrates with and makes a positive contribution to the historic environment; and

Take opportunities to reinstate missing features which are considered important to, or to remove additions or modifications that harm, the significance of the asset.
