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2 Introduction and Scope of Assessment

2.1 BACKGROUND

- 2.1.1 This Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) details a proposal for a programme of archaeological monitoring and recording at The Parish Rooms of St Mary Magdalene's Church, Richmond TW9 1SN (Figures 1 and 2), hereafter referred to as the application site, the proposals or the 'site'). Joe Abrams BA, FSA, MCIfA, Director at Abrams Archaeology, has prepared this document for The Richmond Team Ministry.
- 2.1.2 The site is centred at NGR TQ 17968 74837 and the plot measures c. 360sqm in size. The Parish Rooms occupy a site within a short terrace of buildings on the north-east side of Church Walk: a curved footpath adjoining Paradise Road to the south that encircles St Mary Magdalene's Church.
- 2.1.3 The church, churchyard and adjacent buildings along Church Walk form an historic grouping that is bounded to the north-west by the rear of commercial properties on George Street and Paradise Road to the south. The rear of the Church Walk properties are bounded by Wellington Yard, a service and delivery area for the Tesco supermarket on George Street.

2.2 Reason for Works

2.2.1 A planning application (23/3186/FUL) was submitted on 28/11/2023 and received a Decision Notice from London Borough of Richmond Upon Thames on 22/02/2024. The development proposals comprise the following:

Extension to courtyard. Side extension to the south-east of the Parish Rooms. Change of use to the ground floor of the Parish Rooms, from A3 (restaurants and cafes) to E(g)(i) (offices for admin functions); the existing use F2(b) (halls or meeting places for the principal use of the local community) is to be retained and extended. Provision of an air source heat pump¹.

2.2.2 Condition U0175630 has been placed on the permission and this reads:

No demolition or development shall take place until a written scheme of investigation (WSI) has been submitted to and approved by the local planning authority in writing. For land that is included within the WSI, no demolition or development shall take place other than in accordance with the agreed WSI, which shall include the statement of significance and research objectives, and:

A. The programme and methodology of site investigation and recording and

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the nomination of a competent person(s) or organisation to undertake the agreed works.

- B. Where appropriate, details of a programme for delivering related positive public benefits.
- C. The programme for post-investigation assessment and subsequent analysis, publication & dissemination and deposition of resulting material. This part of the condition shall not be discharged until these elements have been fulfilled in accordance with the programme set out in the WSI.

REASON: To safeguard the archaeological interest on this site.

2.2.3 The development site lies within the London Borough of Richmond Upon Thames, and advice on archaeology is given by the Greater London Archaeology Advisory Service (GLAAS), which is a part of Historic England. This WSI will be submitted to GLAAS for comment and approval.

2.3 Consultation with GLAAS (Historic England)

- 2.3.1 This condition was generated on the basis of advice from the Greater London Archaeology Advisory Service (GLAAS), Historic England. GLAAS have been in communication with Abrams Archaeology since February 2024 via email and have also written to the LPA with advice on this project. GLAAS note that the site is located within a Tier 2 Archaeological priority zone, close to the church of St Mary Magdalene. Several approaches to this project have been discussed and the possibility of opening test-pits/trenches on the site to evaluate the likelihood of human burials was one option.
- 2.3.2 Another option included the re-opening of Site Investigation test-pits opened in November 2020 was also considered. The photographs taken during that test-pitting are contained within this WSI at Appendix 5. However, discussions with GLAAS during July-August 2024 led to the agreement that these test-pits had likely sampled small portions of construction cut (foundation) and that little new archaeological data would be gained by re-opening them.
- 2.3.3 As such, it was agreed, following detailed discussion/s that a watching brief (monitoring) and appropriate investigation and recording response would be a proportionate approach in this instance. The Archaeologist (GLAAS) has specifically advised that all groundworks should be monitored. If in-situ human burials are identified and/or if the remains of structures are identified (e.g. brick tombs or the remains of earlier buildings), a meeting would be held with GLAAS and an appropriate additional investigation methodology would be agreed. Therefore, the Site will not be subject to pre-commencement archaeological test-pitting.
- 2.3.4 This WSI sets out the proposed aims, objectives, methods and details for an archaeological watching brief (archaeological observation and recording work) during all groundworks.

2.3.5 The site work will be managed on behalf of the client by Joe Abrams of Abrams Archaeology. Archaeological site attendance will be carried out by suitably qualified archaeologists from a Registered Organisation².

2.4 GEOLOGY, TOPOGRAPHY AND HYDROLOGY

- 2.4.1 The British Geological Survey (BGS)³ identifies the underlying solid geology across the PDA as being of London Clay Formation Clay and silt. Sedimentary bedrock formed between 56 and 47.8 million years ago during the Palaeogene period. The superficial deposits are Taplow Gravel Member Sand and gravel. Sedimentary superficial deposit formed between 362 and 126 thousand years ago during the Quaternary period. A short distance west (c. 400m) lies the River Thames and alongside this are deposits of Alluvium.
- 2.4.2 The River Thames is the closest watercourse to the PDA. We note that a short distance northwest (c. 200m) at "Richmond Green a spring (Pickwellswell) and conduit head supplying the Shene Charterhouse to the north of the town is also referred to. Remains of a watercourse may still be present within the APA"⁴. There may be other springs and certainly other wells within the historic core of Richmond.
- 2.4.3 The PDA lies at c 10-11m OD and land in the local area climbs to the east and southeast reaching 55m in Richmond Park. To the north the land drops gently in height to reach c. 10m at Richmond Green. To the west, towards the river Thames the land drops in height reaching c. 5m OD alongside the river.

2.5 SITE VISIT

- 2.5.1 A site visit/walkover was completed on 11 September 2023. The Site comprises land to the east of Church Walk. It is made up of two open areas and several areas which lie within buildings. These buildings are not currently in use.
- 2.5.2 The visit confirmed that the Site is comprised of hard surfaces of various kinds. There are existing changes in level within the PDA, but no cellars/basements or other areas of obvious truncation were visible. As with many such locations, the creation of paved areas and floor surfaces will have meant underlying topsoil was disturbed. Some truncation of those layers will have happened. However, the site does not appear to be particularly damaged/terraced by recent land use.
- 2.5.3 This in contrast with, for example, land to the immediate east of the PDA which has been significantly terraced in order to create a sloping access for the commercial property it serves on George Street. We believe that Church Walk,

and the Site, follow a broadly natural slope in topography from south to north. Whereas land to the east of the PDA has been artificially sloped to accentuate that south to north drop. The meaning of this in terms of this WSI is that the PDA appears to be relatively undisturbed by recent land use.

2.6 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.6.1 An Archaeological desk based assessment⁵ was produced in advance of this WSI. This entailed carrying out a search of the GLHER (Report 18000) and considering nearby archaeological reports and studying historic maps in order to become well informed of archaeological potential within the Site.
- 2.6.2 The data tabulated within Appendix 1 was derived from the GLHER and Figures 3-8 show the location of these records in relation to the Site. The desk-based assessment summarised the site conditions, the archaeological potential and the likely impacts of the proposals as follows.

2.7 Specific Site Conditions

- 2.7.1 The Site may have been partly, or completely, within the Medieval churchyard of the Church of St Mary Magdalene. Evidence for this comes from archaeological evaluation to the immediate north of the PDA. A north-south aligned ditch containing Medieval artefactual material was running directly towards the PDA. That land boundary has been long built over, certainly the 18th C to modern day mapping suggests the current boundaries have been broadly static along that (eastern) side of the churchyard.
- 2.7.2 This finding is probably the most key in terms of archaeology. The implications for the distribution of graves, potentially within the PDA needs to be considered.
- 2.7.3 Since the Post-Medieval period, land within the PDA has been developed and re-developed. This is a process which will have impacted the pre-existing below ground deposits. Its likely that foundations and cellars belonging to 18th-19th C buildings may have impacted below ground deposits. Investigations immediately east of the PDA recorded widespread Post-Medieval to modern disturbance and truncation.
- 2.7.4 On balance, we anticipate that the PDA will contain areas of destruction (where archaeological potential has been removed). However, it is likely that elsewhere archaeological potential will have survived. This potential does not necessarily mean remains will exist, this is a related but not identical point. We can only consider potential at this stage.
- 2.7.5 Should remains exist, then based upon nearby investigations it is our view that

the level at which they are most likely to date to the Medieval, Post-Medieval and 19th C. Such remains are likely to occur at a depth of between 8mOD and 9m OD. This is sometimes referred to as the level of archaeological sensitivity.

2.8 Proposed Development

2.8.1 The proposal for the Parish Rooms of St Mary Magdalene's Church (Figure 1) comprises the following:

External and internal changes are proposed at the Parish Rooms in order to create a new 'Parish Centre'. The proposed scheme will include:

- Alterations to ground floor elevation of rear range and lowering of the courtyard;
- Partial rebuilding of existing veranda and provision of new covering with glazed facade;
- Construction of a small two-storey extension on the south-east side of the Parish Rooms, extending into adjacent Church Cottage plot;
- A number of internal alterations that seek to rationalise the space and improve access, including insertion of a lift.⁶
- 2.8.2 We have, via the project Architect and Structural Engineer, sought further detail on the specific below ground implications of the above. These are shown within Appendix 4. The most relevant part of the above, for archaeological impact reasons, is "i. Alterations to ground floor elevation or rear range and lowering of the courtyard." The final drawing presented in Appendix 4 is labelled Proposed Structure: Section B-B. This shows that in order to create a new lowered floor level, within the present day courtyard, it will be necessary to first reduce the ground level by 600mm, then it will be built up by 100mm insulation, 150mm RC slab and 50mm finishes. This giving a floor level which will be 270mm lower than the present day ground level.
- 2.8.3 The construction of a two-storey extension which will extend into the adjacent Church Cottage plot will also require below ground impacts.

2.9 Review of Potential Development Impacts on Archaeological Assets

2.9.1 Within Section 5.2 of the desk-based assessment report⁷ we reviewed nearby investigations and placed a specific emphasis upon the depth of geology and/or archaeological deposits where that was available. This meant obtaining the original investigation reports to check section drawings and photographs. As a result, we can say that the investigations 10m north of the PDA (Evaluation at 29-34 George Street⁸) encountered geological deposits at 8.38m OD. We note that the ground level within the PDA is c. 10m OD.

- 2.9.2 The excavations needed in order to lower the ground floor level, including the courtyard area require excavations of 600mm deep. We note that nine narrow test pits were opened as part of this application process (Appendix 5) and one of these reached sand/gravel 850mm below the existing ground surface, most of the other test-pits ceased at a shallower depth⁹.
- 2.9.3 If we consider these various sources together, then we have a relatively wide area of ground being reduced by 600mm. We have nearby evidence suggesting that archaeological remains in this locality are most likely to date to the Medieval, Post-Medieval and 19th C. Such remains are likely to occur at a depth of between 8m OD and 9m OD. This is sometimes referred to as the level of archaeological sensitivity.
- 2.9.4 Therefore, with the present day ground level being 10m OD, then excavations (for ground reduction) at 600mm should not reach 9m OD. Such excavations may be deep enough to reveal certain types of archaeological remains within the churchyard and its environs. These are likely to be 19th C structural remains and associated deposits.
- 2.9.5 There will also be a need for footings associated with the new extension. The precise depth of excavation is not yet established, though it would be conventional for them to teach at least 1m below the present day ground surface. These groundworks have the potential to disturb below ground archaeological remains as it is often necessary to reach geological deposits for such footings. This is also the depth at which archaeological remains can often be revealed, as they are often (not always) cut into geological deposits.
- 2.9.6 The other Monument and Event records (Appendix 1) will be considered in relations to findings made during fieldwork for this project. If connections can be made then these will be drawn out in the report which follows that work.






Plate 1: John Rocque's London 10 Miles Round Map

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2.10 MAP REGRESSION AND MODERN PERIOD

- 2.10.1 There are plans of this part of Greater London from a relatively early date. A selection of maps were viewed in the preparation of this WSI. Not all are reproduced; they included:
- 2.10.2 Moses Glover's schematic map (1635) of the Area. This map shows a schematic representation of the area. It shows, amongst other things, a detail of the town centre of Richmond, with buildings radiating around the Church of St Mary Magdelene, already built up in the early 17th century. The church appears prominent within this representation.
- 2.10.3 The Prospect of Richmond (1726). This presents the town centre from the vantage point of Richmond Palace, which lies northwest of the PDA. The church of St Mary Magdalene is a focal/central point within the picture. Buildings can be clearly seen along George street, to the south o{ the church. Land to the rear of George Street appears less built up which may be relevant for the PDA which lies in that position. The map is not detailed enough to be more specific than this.
- 2.10.4 John Rocque's Map (1741-45 Plate 1). John Rocque's map (1741-45) shows Richmond town centre with Richmond Green to the north of George street. There are standing buildings on at least part of the PDA on this image. "Church Walk, and the row of terraced properties adjacent to the church and the gap that now forms the courtyard to the Parish Rooms are legible. It is not discernible whether this gap represents a single or double plot (and as such whether the building abutting the south boundary of this gap is the side range as it was in the mid 18th century, or what was the north side of No. 7 Church. Walk). Nos. 1 4 Church Walk are shown in the Rocque map, as well as a considerably larger churchyard. 10"
- 2.10.5 The 'larger churchyard' noted on the Rocque map is referring to its extent at that time to the northwest, towards George Street. With regard to the PDA, the gap between the church and the PDA was similar on the Rocque map and the later Ordnance Survey maps (Appendix 2).
- 2.10.6 Thomas Jefferys' Map of Richmond (1772 Plate 2). The churchyard and its boundary is clearly shown. No buildings on the PDA are shown. However, this is likely to be due to the level of detail on the map rather than the absence of buildings.
- 2.10.7 Tithe Map (1851). Parish of Richmond (IR 29/34/104 Plate 3). Again, the level of detail on this map means that the churchyard boundaries are clear, but the buildings locally are not generally shown. We believe the PDA would have had buildings on it at this time.

- 2.10.8 The Ordnance Survey maps (Appendix 2) are more detailed and show how densely buildings were occupying the PDA during the 19th C and the first half of the 20th C. Review of historic Ordnance Survey (Appendix 2) reveals constant changes in the lateral connection of the buildings along Church Walk. This row of buildings was a series of interlinked spaces, passages and staircase that would have been built and rebuilt as circumstances required.
- 2.10.9 The intricate series of changes and ownership along Church Walk, and within the PDA, is covered within the Heritage Statement¹¹. From an archaeological perspective we need to note that the process of construction and demolition which led to the present day configuration of buildings, will have led to a degree of truncation. It may also have left a levelling layer of rubble material (during demolition).
- 2.10.10 We believe archaeological potential for evidence dating to the Modern period is high within the PDA. This is likely to mean that the remains of 19th C tenement buildings are retained in some form below the existing building (this may be in the form of rubble and possibly infilled cellars and/or foundations.

3 AIMS OF INVESTIGATION

3.1 **A**IMS

- 3.1.1 The general aims of the archaeological watching brief are:
- to determine the presence or absence of archaeological deposits or remains,
- to record the character, date location and preservation of any archaeological remains on site,
- to record the nature and extent of any previous damage to archaeological deposits or remains on site.

3.2 The specific aims of the investigation are:

- 3.2.1 to observe and record any archaeological features so as to ascertain their extent, form, function, and where possible, date.
- 3.2.2 to clean the base and representative sections of the areas opened up by groundworks and to record them in both plan and representative section.
- 3.2.3 Given the possibility of human remains being present. A specific aim is to ensure that any articulated human remains are identified as rapidly as possible, and that groundworks are ceased while such remains are appropriately recorded and lifted. Disarticulated bone, which is common in, and close to, ancient churchyards, is bagged and removed as appropriate.
- 3.2.4 Given the possibility that a boundary ditch for the churchyard runs through the Site in a broadly north to south alignment. It would have formed a small part of the wester boundary of the churchyard in the Medieval and/or Post-Medieval period. We note that a ditch was revealed a short distance north of the site, on this alignment. See Table 4 in the desk-based assessment12 which accompanied this application. Also see the results of Test Pit 2 in the relevant contractor report¹³. This test pit revealed Measured 2.25m by 2.1m and again was excavated through the slab of the Owen Owen building. Within this test pit a north to south aligned ditch with two fills was recorded. Medieval to Post-Medieval material was recovered. We note that this test pit was just 10m north of the Site which is the subject of this WSI.
- 3.2.5 There is also a possibility of earlier structures on this Site. They may post-date the apparent shrinkage of the churchyard from its earlier extent with a boundary further east of the present day boundary. Clearly, building s have

- lined Church Walk for several centuries. It is possible that groundworks will reveal such structures.
- 3.2.6 All of the above types of archaeological remain would trigger a discussion with GLAAS at which we would agree a suitable methodology in order to adequately investigate and record the remains.

3.3 THE OBJECTIVES OF THE PROJECT ARE:

- 3.3.1 to undertake work in accordance with national best practice and guidelines,
- 3.3.2 to archaeologically record any deposits, features or structures of significance,
- 3.3.3 to analyse any remains with reference to the existing documentary evidence for historical development and land use,
- 3.3.4 to produce a written account to include summary; site description; deposit descriptions deposit levels (relative to ordnance datum) conclusions and recommendations for further work,
- 3.3.5 to disseminate the findings of the work in an illustrated report, integrating the findings of the archaeological monitoring to produce as comprehensive a record as possible, and to provide an ordered archive.

3.4 Specific Research Objectives Are:

- 3.4.1 The results of the archaeological investigation will be used to help answer the following questions:
- Does the Site contain the physical remains of buildings which are earlier than those currently standing on the Site?
- Does the Site contain the remains of, part of, the eastern boundary of the Medieval churchyard for St Mary Magdalene's Church?
- Does the site contain either disarticulated or articulated human burials indicative of the land having previously been within the churchyard and used for burials?
- 3.4.2 Should earlier/different archaeological remains be revealed during the works, then the project objectives would be re-examined and revised, as appropriate.

5 METHODOLOGY - FIELDWORK

5.1 Monitoring (Watching Brief)

5.1.1 All construction related groundworks will be subject to monitoring by an archaeologist. The works needing monitoring consist of:

5.2 **ENABLING WORKS STAGE**

- Lifting of existing slabs and breaking out of existing surfaces
- 5.2.1 We would not expect to literally monitor the breaking up of concrete; the key part it's the removal of rubble and the process of reaching the underlying formation level. It will be during this initial removal of rubble/made ground that the upper surface of archaeological remains (if present) may first be revealed. The deeper excavations to reach an appropriate formation depth should also be monitored and may involve going through layers of archaeological interest. In that case, the archaeologist present will communicate with GLAAS and Abrams Archaeology in order to determine the appropriate method of investigation and recording.
- 5.2.2 We note that service trenches and deeper excavations (e.g. drainage runs) are often cut deeper than the level at which some archaeological remains/deposits occur, and so the removal of an existing modern slab and the material directly below it can sometimes be the most opportune stage for a watching brief to take place.

5.3 Construction Groundworks Stage

- 5.3.1 Any groundworks which need to be undertaken using plant will be undertaken using a mechanical excavator and driver which will be controlled and operated by the clients' groundworks contractor. It will use a toothless ditching bucket to undertake the bulk excavation under the supervision of an archaeologist. Spoil will be removed from the working area.
- 5.3.2 Machine excavation needed in order to lower the rear range and courtyard will be made in manageable spits not in excess of 100mm at a time until either significant archaeological strata / remains are found, or until natural deposits are reached, or until formation level is reached.
- 5.3.3 Where safe, the attendant archaeologist, (and where appropriate specialists, surveyor and photographer) will enter the excavation area to record all features exposed. Where there are health and safety factors, which will inhibit access, recording will be made from the existing ground surface.
- 5.3.4 The following works are those which we have identified as being the most likely to require attendance. However, if other groundworks not listed here are

needed, then these too should be subject to archaeological monitoring:

- Alterations to ground floor elevation of rear range and lowering of the courtyard;
- Partial rebuilding of existing veranda and provision of new covering with glazed facade;
- Construction of a small two-storey extension on the south-east side of the Parish Rooms, extending into adjacent Church Cottage plot;
- A number of internal alterations that seek to rationalise the space and improve access, including insertion of a lift.¹⁴
- 5.3.5 Other groundworks which may require monitoring include:
 - Cutting of new footings
 - Cutting of services/drainage runs
 - Ground reduction not mentioned above but which may be needed (e.g. creating pathways/entrances or creating hardstanding)

5.4 THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL CONTRACTOR

- 5.4.1 The archaeological contractor will be afforded sufficient time, space and resources to investigate any potential archaeological deposits or features to their satisfaction in order to meet the aims and objectives of this specification.
- 5.4.2 The purpose of a watching brief investigation is to record archaeological remains in a safe way as work progresses on a development. Work may be stopped for short periods while recording is completed, or when access is restricted, recording may be completed from a safe position and artefacts/ecofacts retrieved from spoil generated during groundworks.
- 5.4.3 Where safe, examination and cleaning of all archaeological deposits will be by hand using appropriate hand tools. Any archaeological deposits will be examined and recorded both in plan and section. Any archaeological features revealed will be sufficiently excavated so as to ascertain their extent, form, function and where possible date as practicable within the confines of proposed development.
- 5.4.4 Should significant archaeological deposits be encountered then excavation will cease and a meeting attended by the following parties will be promptly organised. To be clear, on this site 'significant' means in-situ burials, in-situ structural remains. It does not include disarticulated bone, cut archaeological features such as boundary ditches or pits of the type anticipated on a site in this location. The use of the word significant to differentiate those remains which may require additional resource than a watching brief. The meeting would be held to understand exactly that and to stipulate the type of methodology which was most appropriate. Resources could then be agreed and work would rapidly re-start.

5.4.5 Those attending would be:

- client/client's agent
- Archaeologist, Greater London Archaeology Advisory Service (GLAAS), Historic England
- Abrams Archaeology
- the archaeological contractor
- 5.4.6 will be held to assess the significance of the deposits and to decide on a strategy for sampling them to provide sufficient data for a useful assessment or subsequent mitigation strategy. This meeting may be completed using remote methods (photographs/email) or it may be conducted in person.
- 5.4.7 Should the watching brief identify a previously unknown reason why the site has no, or very low, archaeological potential (e.g. previously unknown and widespread destruction) or if repeated visits result in no significant findings, then Abrams Archaeology will seek a meeting with the GLAAS. This will be held in order to assess when the watching brief may cease. This meeting may be completed using remote methods (photographs/email) or it may be conducted in person.
- 5.4.8 All works will be carried out in accordance with the Code of Approved Practice as set out by the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists¹⁵. Accordingly, the project team will abide by the ClfA's code of approved practice.

5.5 **COMMUNICATION**

- 5.5.1 Close liaison will be maintained between Abrams Archaeology and its archaeological subcontractor in order to ensure that the works are correctly timed in order to gather data at the most appropriate point.
- 5.5.2 Communication protocol will be as follows:

Client – Abrams Archaeology – Archaeological Contractor

Client - Abrams Archaeology - Archaeologist GLAAS

5.6 ARTEFACTS (FINDS)

5.6.1 All identified artefacts (finds), industrial and faunal remains will be collected and retained. Certain classes of building material can sometimes be discarded after recording if an appropriate sample is retained. No finds will, however, be discarded without the prior approval of the archaeological adviser to the local authority.

- 5.6.2 Excavated material will be examined in order to retrieve artefacts to assist in the analysis of the spatial distribution of artefacts.
- 5.6.3 The finds assemblage will be retained for deposition with the site archive at the appropriate Museum (Museum of London) in due course.
- 5.6.4 All finds will be treated in a proper manner and to standards agreed in advance with the recipient museum. They will be exposed, lifted, cleaned, conserved, marked, bagged and boxed in accordance with the guidelines set out in the United Kingdom Institute for Conservation's 'Conservation Guidelines No.2' and the Museum of London's 'Standards for the Preparation of Finds to be Permanently Retained by the Museum of London'. All metal objects will be x-rayed and then selected for conservation (except in those cases where Historic England agrees that this will not be necessary).
- 5.6.5 Ceramic (pottery, clay tobacco, building material fabric and brick form) reference collections, housed at the Museum of London should be referred to for descriptive and analytical purposes in order to ensure that terminology is consistent. All finds which constitute Treasure under the 1996 Treasure Act for England and Wales will be reported to the coroner by the finder within 14 days of discovery.
- 5.6.6 If human remains are revealed then, at all times they should be treated with due decency and respect. Where practical the human remains will be left in situ, covered and protected. Most often, when encountered within an archaeological context, the process is to follow the 1857 Burial Act and, where human remains have been found and development will unavoidably disturb them, the remains will be fully recorded, excavated and removed from the site. In line with the Burial Act 1857, those works will not be carried out until a licence for their excavation is issued by the Ministry of Justice, the requirements of that licence will also be followed. these works will be carried out in accordance with the standards set out in the CIfA Technical Paper No 7¹⁶.
- 5.6.7 As part of this application process the Coroner will be informed and, if appropriate, the Police. The landowner and Archaeologist (GLAAS) will also be informed. The final placing of human remains following analysis will be subject to the requirements of the Ministry of Justice Licence.
- 5.6.8 Should finds that require immediate conservation be encountered, they will be exposed, lifted, cleaned, conserved, marked, bagged and boxed in accordance with the guidelines set out in Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials¹⁷ Appropriate guidance set out in the Museums and Galleries Commissions "Standards in the Museum Care of Archaeological Collections" and the

current CIfA guidelines¹⁹ will also be followed. Packaging of all organic finds and metalwork will follow the UKIC/Rescue guidelines, 'First Aid for Finds'²⁰ Any necessary, conservation and treatment of metalwork will be arranged in conjunction with specialist conservators.

5.7 ECOFACTS – ENVIRONMENTAL SAMPLING

- 5.7.1 Environmental sampling during the evaluation will target a representative range of contexts from each phase. Should significant environmental deposits be encountered, they will be taken and processed in line with Historic England guidelines²¹ and our internal policy. Provision will be made for the requirement of the following samples:
- 5.7.2 Bulk samples of 40-60 litres, or 100% of the context, for process using a floatation tank for the recovery of charred plant remains from the 'flot' and artefacts such as small bones, mineralised plant remains, charcoal and hammer scale from the residues.
- 5.7.3 Samples of 1-5 litres from waterlogged deposits for analysis of waterlogged plant remains. These may be taken as sub-samples from bulk samples.
- 5.7.4 Samples of 5-15 litres from waterlogged deposits for analysis of insect remains and other macroscopic artefacts. These may be taken as sub-samples from bulk samples.
- 5.7.5 Bulk samples of 100 litres for coarse sieving on site for specific artefacts such as animal bone.
- 5.7.6 Samples of 2 litres for mollusc analysis, with associated continuous column samples.
- 5.7.7 Monolith samples which may be sub-sampled for diatom, spore or pollen analysis.
- 5.7.8 Monolith samples for soil micromorphology.
- 5.7.9 All environmental samples will be assessed for potential through summary analyses by an environmental specialist.
- 5.7.10 Bulk samples will be processed as soon as possible or discarded with the agreement of Senior Historic Environment Advisor. Residues will be treated as part of the find's assemblage.

5.8 SCIENTIFIC DATING

- 5.8.1 Where appropriate, samples for scientific dating will be taken.
- 5.8.2 Dendrochronological analysis from timbers.
- 5.8.3 C14 dating from organic material, which may be taken as sub-samples from bulk or monolith samples.
- 5.8.4 Archaeomagnetic dating from hearths or other suitable deposits.

5.9 SITE CODE

- 5.9.1 The site code will be allocated ahead of any fieldwork commencing. This code will be used to label all sheets, plans and other drawings; all context and recording sheets; all photographs (but not negatives); all other elements of the documentary archive.
- 5.9.2 The Site Code will be obtained by the Archaeological Contractor from Museum of London.

5.10 RECORDING SYSTEM

- 5.10.1 The recording system used will follow the Museum of London Archaeological Site Manual.²² Context sheets will include all relevant stratigraphic relationships. If there is any doubt over recording techniques, the Museum of London Archaeological Site Manual will be used as a guide.
- 5.10.2 A site location plan at an appropriate scale will be prepared showing investigation area and development site in relation to surrounding locality.
- 5.10.3 This will be supplemented by a detailed plan, also at an appropriate scale, which will show the location of the areas investigated in relation to the overall site boundary.
- 5.10.4 Burials will be drawn at 1:10. Other detailed plans will be drawn at an appropriate scale, usually 1:50 or 1:20.
- 5.10.5 The extent of any visible archaeological deposits will be recorded in plan. Long sections showing layers and any cut features will be drawn at 1:50. Short sections will be drawn at 1:20.
- 5.10.6 Sections containing significant deposits, including half sections, will be drawn at an appropriate scale, usually 1:10 or 1:20. All sections will be related to the Ordnance Datum using spot heights and registers of sections and plans will be kept.
- 5.10.7 Upon completion of each significant feature at least one sample section will be

- drawn, including a profile of the top of natural deposits (extrapolated from cut features etc. if it has not been fully excavated). The stratigraphy will be recorded, even if no archaeological deposits have been identified.
- 5.10.8 An adequate photographic record will be made of and any significant archaeological remains, including photographs of sections. This will comprise high resolution digital photography, illustrating in both detail and general context the principal features and finds discovered. The photographic record will also include working shots to illustrate the general nature of the archaeological works. A register of all photographs taken will be kept on standardised forms.

5.11 COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

- 5.11.1 On site staff will be able to answer questions from members of the public regarding the archaeology of the area and potential archaeology of the site as described in publicly available documents.
- 5.11.2 Detailed inquiries from members of the public regarding the results of the works, or sensitive information, will be directed to the client's archaeological representative, Joe Abrams of Abrams Archaeology.
- 5.11.3 Given the nature and scale of the works, information boards, site tours and other community involvement activities are not considered appropriate.

6 REPORTING

- 6.1 Reporting Requirements if Results are of Low/Local Significance
 - 6.1.1 Should the project reveal relatively straightforward deposits of local significance, it will be appropriate to complete a single stage of post-excavation reporting. This would comprise a commercial archaeological report. It would cover the results of the archaeological monitoring (watching brief) and would be prepared on completion of the fieldwork. The report will conform to the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists Standards and Guidance²³ and will include:
 - Non-technical summary (abstract)
 - Introductory statements and site background
 - The aims and methods adopted in the course of the investigation
 - A description of the nature, extent, date, condition and significance of all archaeological deposits recorded during the investigation, with specialist opinions and parallels from other sites if appropriate
 - Illustrative material including maps, plans, sections, drawings and photographs as necessary.
 - A catalogue of finds, including any specialist reports
 - A discussion and summary of the results, including a statement of significance.
 - An index of the contents and location of the archive
 - Sources consulted.
 - A copy of the OASIS record sheet
 - 6.1.2 The report will be submitted in draft form to the Archaeologist (GLAAS), for comment. Following approval, a digital copy of the report will be sent to the client. Subject to any contractual requirements on confidentiality, copies of the report will be submitted to the within six months of completion of the report.
 - 6.1.3 Any information deposited in the Historic Environment Record can be freely copied without reference to the originator for research or planning purposes.
- 6.2 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS IF RESULTS ARE OF MEDIUM/REGIONAL SIGNIFICANCE (OR ABOVE)
 - 6.2.1 Should the project reveal relatively significant remains of Medium/Regional significance, it would be appropriate to report the results in two stages:
 - 6.2.2 Stage 1 Assessment and updated project design (UPD). Would quantify the contextual, artefactual, ecofactual remains on the site. It would link these via specialist reports to research aims (period, area) and would make

- recommendations for which classes of remains should be progressed to Stage 2 (analysis and publication)
- 6.2.3 Stage 2 Analysis and Publication. Would utilise the UPD to guide costs and focus of analytical works and what should be published and where.
- 6.2.4 If this type of post-excavation work were appropriate a meeting would be held with the Archaeologist (GLAAS), Abrams Archaeology and the client. This would decide the appropriate scope of works. A budget would then be agreed to cover such works. The reporting would conform to the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists Standards and Guidance²⁴.

7 STAFFING AND PROGRAMMING

- 7.1.2 The start date for the commencement of the site works is currently to be confirmed (tbc).

7.2 Programming and Resources

- 7.2.1 Our client has agreed a fee sufficient to undertake all elements of the work to which these specifications relate.
- 7.2.2 The fieldwork phase of archaeological investigation work is to be undertaken as set out above and programmed as soon as practicably possible following approval of this WSI.
- 7.2.3 Sequencing of the work will be discussed with relevant parties.

7.3 Monitoring

7.3.1 The project will be monitored by an Archaeologist from GLAAS. Abrams
Archaeology will make every effort to allow proper monitoring of the
archaeological investigation. Any variations to this specification will be put in
writing and approval sought.

7.4 Access and Safety

- 7.4.1 Reasonable access to the site will be arranged for the Local Planning Authority and their archaeological advisor who may wish to make site inspections to ensure that the archaeological investigations are progressing satisfactorily.
- 7.4.2 Before any site work commences, a full risk assessment document will be produced setting out the site specific health and safety policies that will be enforced in order to reduce to an absolute minimum any risks to health and safety. In addition to this risk assessment, the following considerations will also be made:
- 7.4.3 All relevant health and safety regulations will be followed. Barriers, hoardings and warning notices will be installed as appropriate. Safety helmets and



visibility jackets will be used by all personnel as necessary.

- 7.4.4 No personnel will work in deep unsupported excavations.
- 7.4.5 All works will be carried out in line with current working practices in relation to COVID-19.



8 ARCHIVING AND DISSEMINATION

8.1 Archive

- 8.1.1 The site code will be used to mark all plans, drawings, context and recording sheets, photographs and other site material during excavation.
- 8.1.2 The site archive will be organised so as to be compatible with current requirements of the Museum of London. Individual descriptions of all archaeological strata and features excavated or exposed will be entered onto pro-forma recording sheets. Relevant context, sample and photograph registers and environmental sample sheets will also be used.
- 8.1.3 On completion of the finds analysis, the landowner will be asked to sign a Deed of Transfer, transferring title of the finds to the appropriate local repository.
- 8.1.4 The integrity of the site archive will be maintained. All finds and records will be properly curated (subject to the Deed of Transfer) by the local repository and be available for public consultation. Appropriate guidance set out in the MGC "Standards in Museum Care of Archaeological Collections" and the SMAs draft "Selection, Retention and Dispersal of Archaeological Collections" will be followed in all circumstances.
- 8.1.5 The minimum acceptable standard for the archival report is defined in Appendix 2 of the "Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment The MoRPHE Project Managers' Guide"²⁷. It will include all materials recovered (or the comprehensive record of such materials) and all written, drawn and photographic records relating directly to the investigations undertaken. It will be quantified, ordered, indexed and internally consistent. It will also contain a site matrix, a site summary and brief written observations on the artefactual and environmental data.
- 8.1.6 CIfA for the Standard and guidance for the collection, documentation, conservation and research of archaeological materials²⁸ will be followed. With consent of the landowner, arrangements for the curation of the site archive will be agreed with the appropriate local repository (Museum of London).
- 8.1.7 Pursuant to these agreements, the archive will be presented to the appropriate local repository within 6 months of the completion of the fieldwork (unless alternative arrangements have been agreed in writing with the LPA). In

13.1 Nine Site Investigation Trial Pits

- 13.1.1 In November 2020, Stand Consulting Engineers opened nine Site Investigation Test Pits within the Site. These were not opened for archaeological reasons and were not monitored by an archaeologist.
- 13.1.2 We note that the test pits were located so as to best understand the foundations of the standing buildings. This means that the narrow test pits will largely, if not completely, been located within the foundation cut. Therefore, they were unlikely to reveal undisturbed archaeological deposits. However, we note that Test Pit 5 and Test Pit 7 appear to contain material which may have been derived from earlier deposits.
- 13.1.3 Future groundworks on the Site will be monitored and the monitoring archaeologist will record and investigate any such deposits or in-situ structural remains.










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
Figure 1. Site Location










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
