Comment: My favourite building in Twickenham because it is a rare survival from before the arrival of the railway and the town became a dormitory town to London.

Unfortunately, the otherwise comprehensive heritage study has made an error about the origins of the building: it was originally a bakery on Twickenham Common belonging to the Chamberlain family, not a grocer's shop. In fact, May Road was previously known as Chamberlain Road. It is still remembered fondly by many longstanding residents for the quality of its bread and cakes. In addition to serving as a bakery, the house was also a sub-post office. The earliest record I can find for it is in Pigot's Directory of 1826/7, so the house, which is sadly not Listed by Historic England but classified as a Building of Townscape Merit, is almost 200 years old. Such an ancient survival from the past deserves our respect.
