

To maintain cyclical pruning schedule, improve light into surrounding 5 gardens and clearance from adjacent property roof; Reduce canopy height by 2-3m and lateral spread by 2-3m via branch end thinning and 'drop crotch' method as per British Standard 3998:2010. Remove deadwood, weak and suppressed branches. Crown lift over adjacent property to ensure 3m clearance from roof and side elevations. Current height 18m Proposed height 16m - Current spread 16m Proposed spread 13m

DETAILED REASONS

U0195343 Reason for refusal

This application has been partially refused, specifically regarding the proposed reduction of the canopy height and lateral spread of the Cedar of Lebanon (T1) located in the rear garden. While the tree is a very large, mature specimen under Tree Preservation Order (TPO), the proposed reduction works have not been fully justified as necessary.

The reduction of the canopy height by 2-3 meters and the lateral spread by 2-3 meters would remove a significant proportion of the tree's overall volume. The Cedar of Lebanon is a prominent and highly valued specimen, contributing to the character and visual amenity of the local area. Reductions of this scale risk compromising the tree's natural form and aesthetic value, particularly as the tree has already been reduced four years ago. Excessive pruning at short intervals can lead to stress and an increase in vigorous, poorly attached regrowth, which would undermine the long-term health and stability of the tree.

While the application references the need for improved light into surrounding gardens and clearance from the adjacent property roof, these objectives do not warrant such extensive canopy reductions. Light issues can often be mitigated through more targeted interventions, such as minor pruning to specific branches, without resorting to such substantial reductions. Clearance from the adjacent property roof can also be achieved through localized pruning, focusing only on branches directly encroaching on the building.

U0195344 Permitted Works

However, the following aspects of the application are deemed acceptable. The following work is permitted:

- Remove deadwood, weak and suppressed branches.
- Crown lift over adjacent property to ensure 3m clearance from roof and side elevations.

TP03 BS3998 (2010)

The proposed work is to be carried out to British Standard 3998 (2010) Tree Work Recommendations, by a reputable tree surgeon to the satisfaction of the Tree Preservation Officer who should be informed of the date of commencement of work.

DETAILED INFORMATIVES

P02 Section 78 - Appeal

The applicant's attention is drawn to Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990, by which an appeal may be made to the Secretary of State within 28 days of notification of this decision.

Additional Standard Informatives

1. If you alter the proposals in any way a further application(s) will be required. Accordingly, you should contact the Tree Preservation Officer of Environment |Planning and Review Department, Civic centre, 44 York Street, Twickenham TW1 3BZ.

2. You are advised that if you are not the owner(s) of the tree(s) the subject of the approval(s) that the permission of the tree owner(s) will be required prior to the commencement of work(s). Accordingly, if you are not the owner(s) you should discuss the application(s) with them forthwith.

Protected Species and Habitat

The decision of the council in this notice does not obviate the need to comply with legislation and regulations pertaining to the protection of the environment, habitat, and wildlife. It is the responsibility of the landowner and those in undertaking works on their behalf, to ensure that works do not either intentionally or recklessly disturb flora, fauna and habitats afforded protection.

Legislation related to these matters includes but is not limited to:

- The Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981
- Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000
- Protection of Badgers Act 1992
- The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017

TPO Applications Making an Appeal – Summary Guidance

Whether to appeal

If the Local Planning Authority (LPA) turn down your application, you should look carefully at the reasons why they turned it down before you make an appeal. You should speak to the LPA to see if you can sort out the problem - perhaps by changing your proposal. An appeal should only ever be a last resort.

Type of appeal:

Planning Application

Appeal time:

Within 28 days of the date of the council's decision letter.

Who can appeal?

The applicant or their agent may lodge an appeal.

The right of appeal:

You can appeal against the council's decision:

- If you applied to the Local Planning Authority and they:
 - Refused permission;
 - o Gave permission but with conditions you think are inappropriate;
 - Haven't approved the details of a scheme which they or the Secretary of State have already given outline planning permission for or;
 - Have approved the details of a scheme but with conditions you think are inappropriate or unreasonable.
- If the LPA rejected a proposal arising from a condition or limitation on a planning permission.
- If the LPA don't decide your application within the time allowed. Normally the time allowed is eight weeks from when they accept your application.
- If the LPA told you they needed more information before they could decide your outline planning application, but you do not want to supply this.

You will make your appeal to the Department for Communities and Local Government of which the Planning Inspectorate is a part. Most are decided by specialist officers in the Planning Inspectorate. Only the person or business applying for consent to display an advertisement may appeal. If the council issues a discontinuance notice, only those on whom the notice is served may appeal.

The appeal process:

Appeals must be made

- Online at www.planninginspectorate.gov.uk, or
- Initial Appeals, The Planning Inspectorate, Temple Quay House, 2 The Square, Temple Quay, Bristol BS1 6PN.

It will be expected that all appeal documentation will be submitted electronically.

The process is fully documented on the website of the Planning Inspectorate www.planninginspectorate.gov.uk, however in summary there are three main types of appeal:

Written procedure:

Written evidence is considered from the applicant/agent/business and the council. The council will send copies of any letters of objection or support they received when considering your application. Within six weeks of the Inspectorate receiving your appeal forms the council will send a copy of their statement to the Inspectorate. You must make any comment on these within three weeks.

Hearing procedure:

Hearings allow you and the council to exchange views and discuss your appeal. Before the hearing the council will send a copy of their statement to you and the Inspectorate. You can comment on their statement in writing otherwise the Inspectorate will treat the reasons given in your appeal form as the basis of your case for discussion.

Hearings are usually held in council offices. The Inspector leads the discussion and invites the people involved to put their points across. The Inspector will visit the site unaccompanied before the hearing and will make a further accompanied visit as part of the hearing.

Inquiry procedure:

Inquiries are normally for large-scale applications. A public inquiry is a formal procedure in which both parties have legal representation.

Making your views known on someone else's appeal:

The LPA will notify anyone who took part in the consultations when you first applied for permission that you are appealing. For appeals decided by hearing or inquiry the LPA will tell interested people when and where this will be and let them know that they can attend. The Inspectorate will also take account of the views of certain groups who have a right to comment, for example, owners of a site, local amenity groups and so on.

Costs:

Normally you and the council will pay for your own expenses in an appeal. You can only claim costs when you can show that the council have behaved in an unreasonable way causing unnecessary expense.
